leaf

(noun)

- 1. A **leaf** catches sunshine to make food.
- 2. A **leaf**, a stem, a root, and a flower are all parts of plants.
- 3. The tree did not have a single **leaf** on its branches in winter.

insect

(noun)

- 1. An **insect** is sometimes called a *bug*.
- 2. An **insect** has six legs and three body parts: the head, the thorax, and the abdomen.
- 3. A beetle, a bee, and an ant are each a kind of **insect**.

bird

(noun)

- I can recognize a bird by its beak and wings.
- 2. A bird lays eggs.
- 3. A **bird** is warm-blooded and is the only animal with feathers.

forest

(noun)

- 1. Many squirrels, birds, and insects find shelter and food in a **forest**.
- 2. A rainforest gets a lot of rain, while a dry **forest** gets very little.
- 3. Another word for forest is woods.

snake

(noun)

- A snake is a kind of reptile with a long body and no legs.
- 2. A **snake** has scales on its body, but a frog does not.
- 3. \triangle snake sheds its skin as it grows.

frog (noun)

- I . \triangle frog has long back legs for hopping.
- 2. As a tadpole, a **frog** breathes with gills, but as an adult, it breathes with lungs.
- 3. A **frog** takes in water through its skin, so it doesn't need to drink.

lizard

(noun)

- I. \triangle lizard is a reptile with a long, scaly body and four legs.
- 2. A **lizard** has scales, and a salamander has smooth skin.
- 3. The largest **lizard** is the Komodo dragon, which can be ten feet long and weigh 150 pounds.

moss

(noun)

- 1. **Moss** is a simple plant that has no flowers, seeds, or true roots.
- Moss grows in damp areas where light is limited, such as woods.
- 3. In cold regions, more **moss** may grow on the north sides of trees than the south sides because the south sides face the Sun and dry out more quickly.
